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Build the Flexibility to Address 21st Century Security Challenges

- Fundamental reform of the U.S. export control system is driven by national security protect "crown jewel" technologies and expedite cooperation with allies and partners
- Export Control Reform supports new DoD Strategic Guidance set forth in "Sustaining U.S. Global Leadership: Priorities for the 21st Century Defense," including:

Ensuring allies and partners have advanced capabilities so they may take on greater defense roles and missions, but protect the very technology that enables "Smart Defense" – smaller, more agile and technologically advanced forces

Facilitating cooperation with our allies and close partners in order to share technology and costs of developing future weapons systems

Status of the Four Singles

- Single IT system (based on DoD's USXPORTS)
 - Expect full operational capability with all agencies by late-2012 (Departments of Commerce, State, Treasury, Energy, Intelligence Community, Homeland Security, NASA)

• Export Enforcement Coordination Center (E2C2) at DHS


- E2C2 opened on March 7, 2012
- Also opened new Information Triage Unit, under the Director for National Intelligence, to coordinate intelligence community support

• Single Export Control List

- Work on-going to rewrite USML and CCL so that eventually the two can be merged into one list
- New controls, with clear and objective parameters, should be easier for allies and partners to navigate
- Single Control (Licensing) Agency
 - Requires legislation Administration's bill has not yet been submitted to Congress




Technology Security/Foreign Disclosure (TSFD) Previous: Multiple Entry/Exit – Multiple 'Pipes'
